



Q: I'm looking into wood floors for my house renovations but want an alternative to oak. I find walnut too dark but want something different. Can you help?

A: Flooring is a great opportunity to make a real statement. It's one of those large areas that tend to be expensive and doesn't get changed very often, so always spend as much as you can as it has to stand up to the test of time. Copenhagen-based flooring wizards have come up with an amazing marbled wood design called Marbeekos Wood that is both beautiful and unique. See it at smidkerstudio.dk. It's priced at £2,400 for a minimum order of 10 sqm. For a more traditional look with a twist, try an oversized chevron or parquet design flooring and perhaps try Douglas Fir. If you are looking for something with an eco-credential, cherry or sycamore are both in abundance and totally overlooked in the UK. Don't think of them as the reddish woods of the 80s and 90s, treat with a white oil to really bring out the wood's natural beauty.

Q: Where can I find cool light switches and plug sockets? I want something fun and stylish.

A: The devil is in the detail and it's great to hear from someone who likes to think about those finishing touches!
